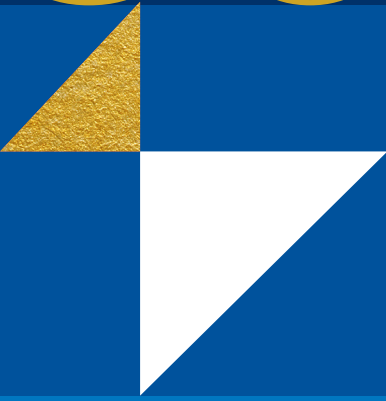

HISTORY AND MISSION

Established in 1965, the Roger Lehecka Double Discovery Center at Columbia University has served as a beacon of hope for over 25,000 first-generation students from low-income communities in New York City. Our unique approach provides high school students with programs that support their academic enrichment, their overall health and wellness, and, most importantly, their college aspirations. We are one of only a few college access and success programs in the country that leverages the expertise of an Ivy League institution, while offering reciprocal benefits for both the high school student and the Columbia undergraduates who serve as mentors, tutors, instructors, and wellness support.

Our “double discovery” frame has provided decades of Columbia undergraduates with the opportunity to change and be changed by the high school students they partner with. From the initial class in 1965 to the present day, our goal remains unchanged: to empower Columbia undergraduates to provide comprehensive support and guidance that not only helps NYC high school students succeed to, through, and beyond college but also helps break the cycle of intergenerational poverty, transforming lives and communities.

JAMES P. SHENTON AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE

The late James P. Shenton CC'49, GSAS'54 was a remarkable Columbia history professor who helped guide the creation of Project Double Discovery, later renamed the Double Discovery Center (DDC).

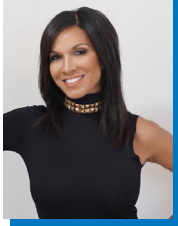

OPENING REMARKS



Josef Sorett

*Dean of Columbia College and
Vice President for Undergraduate Education*

Josef Sorett serves as Dean of Columbia College, the Henry L. and Lucy G. Moses Professor, and Vice President for Undergraduate Education at Columbia University. Dean Sorett's central focus is to ensure that students have the best possible experience inside and outside the classroom. The dean stewards the College curriculum, as well as the other academic, co-curricular, and programmatic services that form the foundation of the student experience at the College and across Columbia's undergraduate schools.

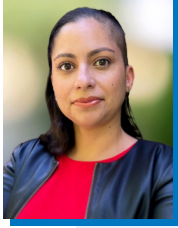
Before his current roles, Dean Sorett chaired the Department of Religion, directed the Center on African-American Religion, Sexual Politics & Social Justice, and served as director of undergraduate studies in the Departments of Religion and African American and African Diaspora Studies. A recipient of Columbia's Lenfest Distinguished Faculty Award (2018) and Presidential Award for Teaching Excellence (2022), he has also sat on numerous departmental and University-wide committees, councils and boards, including the Joint Committee on Instruction, which oversees the College and General Studies, the Faculty of Arts and Sciences Policy Planning Committee, and the Inclusive Public Safety Advisory Committee.

As an interdisciplinary scholar of religion and race in the Americas, Dean Sorett employs primarily historical and literary approaches to the study of religion in Black communities and cultures in the United States, straddling the disciplines of history, literature, religion, art, and music. His first book, *Spirit in the Dark: A Religious History of Racial Aesthetics* (Oxford, 2016), illuminates how religion has figured in debates about Black art and culture across the 20th century. His second book, an edited volume, *The Sexual Politics of Black Churches*, was published in 2022 by Columbia University Press. Dean Sorett's third book, *Black is a Church: Christianity and the Contours of African American Life* (Oxford), was published in 2023. He is currently working on a fourth, *There's a God on the Mic: Hip Hop's (Surprising) Religious History*.

Dean Sorett's courses, including those in the Core Curriculum, African-American Studies and gospel music, are immensely popular. In his classrooms, students grapple with profound questions about culture, identity and race. They are challenged to think freely and critically about the people and ideas that have shaped our world.

Before joining Columbia's faculty in 2009, Dean Sorett was a fellow at the W.E.B. Du Bois Research Institute at Harvard University, where he also completed his Ph.D. in African American Studies. He earned a B.S. from Oral Roberts University, an M.Div. in religion and literature from Boston University, and a Ph.D. in African American studies from Harvard.

Sasha Wells is the Executive Director of the Roger Lehecka Double Discovery Center at Columbia University. Born in Puerto Rico and raised in the South Bronx by an amazing single mom, Sasha has dedicated over 20 years to the educational and nonprofit sectors, with a focus on developing volunteer programs that emphasize crafting meaningful opportunities for young people. She joined Columbia University in 2011 and has served as Executive Director of the Roger Lehecka Double Discovery Center (DDC) since 2022.

Before leading DDC, Sasha held senior roles in the Office of the Dean at Columbia College, where she managed alumni leadership boards, strategic initiatives, and served as Deputy Chief of Staff to Dean James J. Valentini. In a full circle moment, she also served as the planning lead for the DDC's 50th Anniversary Gala.

Before joining Columbia, Sasha worked with the American Red Cross in Greater New York and the National MS Society, where she designed youth development programs, led volunteer engagement efforts, and secured funding for large-scale community initiatives. Sasha earned her B.S. in Human Development from Cornell University and an M.A. in Organizational Psychology from Columbia University's Teachers College. Known for her commitment to excellence, humility, and humor, she is deeply respected for her collaborative leadership and heart for young people. At home, Sasha is a proud wife/mom/sister, a daughter to a two-time cancer survivor, and a cat herder for three pampered Persian cats.

Pulitzer Prize, Grammy, Tony, and Emmy Award-winning composer, arranger, orchestrator, and producer

Tom Kitt is a two-time Tony, two-time Emmy, two-time Grammy, and Pulitzer Prize Award winner. As a musical theater composer, he has written the music for six Broadway shows: *Next to Normal* (Tony Award, Olivier Nomination), *If/Then* (Tony Nomination), *Almost Famous* (Tony Nomination), *Flying Over Sunset* (Tony Nomination), *High Fidelity*, and *Bring it On, The Musical*. His work for the stage has also been seen Off Broadway at Second Stage (*Next to Normal*, *Superhero*), The Public Theater (*The Visitor*, *Shakespeare in the Park*) and he has worked at some of the most prestigious regional theaters including The Old Globe, Arena Stage, Berkeley Rep, The Signature Theater, and ART.

In addition, Tom's Broadway credits as an orchestrator, arranger, and music supervisor include: *Next to Normal* (Tony Award), *Hell's Kitchen* (Tony Nomination, Grammy Award), *The SpongeBob Musical* (Tony Nomination), *Jagged Little Pill* (Tony Nomination, Grammy Award), *Almost Famous*, *Head Over Heels*, *Everyday Rapture*, *American Idiot*, and *Redwood*. Tom has also been active in the world of film and TV. As one of the vocal arrangers working on the Pitch Perfect films, Tom most notably helped create the classic "Riff-off."

Tom also served as music supervisor/arranger/orchestrator for *Grease Live*, and contributed songs for *Royal Pains*, *Penny Dreadful*, and *Sesame Street*. He also provided music supervision for the NBC series, *Rise* and served as a Supervising Music Producer on the Bobby Lopez/Kristen Anderson-Lopez/Steven Levenson/Thomas Kail musical television series *Up Here*. And he is known for his three original opening numbers for The Tony Awards, "This Party's for You" in 2024, written with Amanda Green for Ariana Debose, "Live" in 2019, written with David Javerbaum for James Corden, and the Emmy Award winning "Bigger" in 2013, written with Lin-Manuel Miranda for Neil Patrick Harris. Tom is also proud that his musical adaptation of *Freaky Friday*, co-written with Bridget Carpenter and Brian Yorkey was turned into an original movie musical for Disney Channel and will be making its UK debut in the fall of 2025. Tom is a Sony Masterworks artist, with whom he recorded his debut album, *Reflect* in 2021.

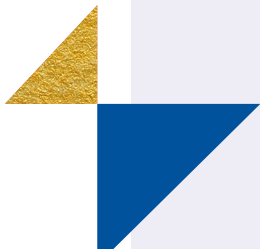
Denise De Las Nueces, MD MPH CC '03

Chief Medical Officer, Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program

Denise De Las Nueces, MD, MPH, is a board-certified physician in internal medicine and addiction medicine, with a focus on serving historically disadvantaged populations. She received her Bachelor of Arts from Columbia University and subsequently attended Harvard Medical School before completing her training at the Brigham and Women's Hospital Internal Medicine Residency Program. Dr. De Las Nueces was awarded a Commonwealth Fund Fellowship in Minority Health Policy and subsequently earned a Master of Public Health degree in Health Policy from the Harvard School of Public Health, following the completion of her residency training. She joined the Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program (BHCHP) in 2012.

Dr. De Las Nueces has been recognized as one of Boston's Top 40 under 40 Leaders by the Boston Business Journal and has received a 40 Under 40 Leaders in Health Award from the National Minority Quality Forum. She served as the Medical Director of BHCHP for seven years before assuming the role of Chief Medical Officer. After a year-long stint as Interim CEO, she has returned to the CMO role for the program. She holds an academic appointment as Assistant Professor of Medicine at the Chobanian and Avedisian School of Medicine at Boston University. She sits on the board of the Blue Cross Blue Shield of Massachusetts Foundation. Dr. De Las Nueces also serves as a member of the Health Equity Compact, a group of over 65 leaders of color from diverse Massachusetts organizations and sectors, who aim to advance health equity in the state.

Dr. De Las Nueces was born and raised in Washington Heights, the daughter of immigrants from the Dominican Republic. She credits much of her personal and professional growth to the many mentors she has had throughout her career as a life-long learner, including Double Discovery Center mentors who provided invaluable guidance during her high school years as a participant in DDC's Talent Search program.

Duchesne Drew CC'89

*Senior Vice President, American Public Media Group
President, Minnesota Public Radio*

Duchesne Drew is Senior Vice President at American Public Media Group and President of Minnesota Public Radio. In this role, he leads the teams that produce MPR News, The Current, APM Reports, and YourClassical.

Before joining American Public Media Group, Duchesne led the Bush Foundation's leadership programs, community innovation, and communication teams and built networks across the region as its Community Network vice president.

Before his role at the Bush Foundation, Duchesne was managing editor of operations at the Minnesota daily newspaper, the Star Tribune, where he began as a summer intern and rose to one of the most senior roles in the newsroom. In 2019, he was honored with the Widening the Circle Award by ThreeSixty Journalism, recognizing individuals who have contributed to the next generation of journalists, particularly those who promote inclusion and diversity. In 2021, he was inducted into the Hall of Achievement at Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism. Duchesne was awarded the 2022 Spurgeon Award for outstanding community leadership, and he was named to The Root 100 in 2022 and again in 2024, an annual list of the most influential Black Americans in the fields of arts, community, business, entertainment, media, and politics. Duchesne serves on the Board of Directors for the McKnight Foundation and is an alumnus and member of the Columbia University Board of Trustees.

Khadijah Sharif-Drinkard is a deal maker, change agent and champion of truth. She has more than thirty years of experience in the media and entertainment industry and serves as Senior Vice President, Business Affairs for ABC News.

Prior to joining The Walt Disney Company, Khadijah served as Senior Vice President, Business and Legal Affairs at ViacomCBS and as Vice President, Senior Counsel, Nickelodeon, where she helped launch such hits as Dora the Explorer, Diego and The Backyardigans.

Khadijah earned her Bachelor's Degree in Political Science from Columbia University and her Juris Doctor from Fordham University School of Law. She is a 2024 graduate of Harvard-CTAM (Harvard Business School's Executive Education Program for high performing media, entertainment and tech executives), a graduate of Class XXII of the Women in Cable Telecommunications' (WICT) Betsy Magness Leadership Institute (a premier leadership program for women in the media industry), and a proud member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. Khadijah has traveled and served on delegations to South Africa (where she was the guest of Nelson and Winnie Mandela), Rome, Russia, China and the United Kingdom. She is a former Chairwoman of the Board of Directors for the Black Entertainment & Sports Lawyers Association, Chair Emerita for the Board of Columbia College Women, former Executive Board member for Columbia College Alumni Association, and former Board Chair for Horizons Newark, a program aimed at closing the achievement and the opportunity gap for inner-city children.

Khadijah was named the National Bar Association's Entertainment Attorney of the Year (2024), received the Ruth Whitehead Whaley Award from Fordham Law School, the New Jersey Muslim Lawyers Association Medal of Honor, the inaugural Corporate Counsel of the Year Award from the Muslim Bar Association of New York, the National Association of Multi-Ethnicity in Communications (NAMIC) Luminary Award for her business acumen and her commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion, and a NAACP Image Award for her work on the children's animated program "Kasha and the Zulu King".

Khadijah has been featured in The New York Times and is a contributing author to the book *Living Islam Out Loud: American Muslim Women Speak* (Beacon Press). Her book, *Power Reimagined*, will be released in 2026 (Harvard Business Review Press).

While a DDC student Khadijah sued the New York State Education Department for its unequal scholarship distribution practices – and won. She also served as Class Speaker for her DDC graduation and is the proud recipient of the 1989 DDC Elizabeth Piper top scholarship. Although a proud member of the TRIO Talent Search Program, she also spent much of her time at the DDC with her fellow TRIO Upward Bound Program and Career Beginning students.

Most of all, she is the proud mother of two amazing young women and has been married to her husband for nearly three decades.

Roger Lehecka CC'67, GSAS'74

Partner, R&R Education Consultants

Former Dean of Students, Columbia College

Born and raised in New York City, Mr. Lehecka attended public schools before enrolling at Columbia College where he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and graduated with honors. He subsequently earned graduate degrees from Harvard and Columbia.

As an undergraduate, Mr. Lehecka was a co-founder of Project Double Discovery, now known as the Double Discovery Center, which in 1965 was a pilot program for Upward Bound.

He spent 19 of the 33 years that he worked at Columbia as Dean of Students of Columbia College (1979–98) and 30 years as an officer of its Phi Beta Kappa chapter. He also spent 20 years as Columbia University's representative on the Ivy Policy Committee, including six as its chair.

As Dean of Students, Mr. Lehecka made increasing the overall College graduation rate and eliminating racial disparities in graduation rates his first priorities; both those goals were achieved. An early advocate for the admission of women to the College, he played a role in its smooth transition to coeducation. He oversaw the expansion of Columbia's New York State Higher Education Opportunity Program into a National Opportunity Program and helped to begin and shape the program of resident professors in several college residence halls. Integrating academic life and residential life, and having his staff understand the primacy of Columbia's academic mission, were important priorities for him as Dean of Students.

Although Mr. Lehecka retired as an administrator in December 2004, he continues to serve Columbia, including more than 30 years on the Board of Friends of the Double Discovery Center. Since 2007, he has taught an undergraduate seminar at Columbia on Equity and Access in American Higher Education. In February 2015, he received the Heritage Award from Columbia's Black Alumni Council. At a time of great need, he returned as Interim Dean of Undergraduate Student Life for the 2024-5 academic year.

As the principals in R&R Education Consultants, Mr. Lehecka and his wife Ria M. Coyne have helped companies and foundations develop and run college scholarship programs for needy students. Their clients have included the Lenfest Foundation, (rural Pennsylvania students), the Kovner Foundation (Florida students), and the New York Times College Scholarship Program, (New York City students). Their three daughters have all been volunteers at DDC.
